

Rewilding Arcadia Phase Two and the Joint Review of the Thames Strategies

Due to climate change, flood risk is increasing on the Thames. Measures to manage this increasing risk are set out by the Environment Agency in both the TE2100 and River Thames Scheme Datchet to Teddington policy documents. Whilst measures are proposed upstream of Weybridge and downstream of the TLS area to provide additional protection, there is little scope to introduce new engineered protection to the functioning floodplain between Weybridge and Kew. For example, the TE2100 scheme recommends a policy of living with water on the functioning floodplain for the Twickenham and Richmond Reaches. The EA's policy to manage floodrisk on the Tideway, TE2100, sets out a planned change in the operation of the Thames Barrier that will affect the floodplain in the coming decades. 'The Environment Agency will work with Hounslow and Richmond Councils to identify areas of Twickenham and Richmond policy units that currently benefit from closing the Thames Barrier during fluvial events. In these areas, the EA will work with local communities and partners to agree and put alternative flood risk management measures in place for less significant fluvial events, improving resilience before the Thames Barrier Operation changes' (TE2100 Outcome 15).

The functioning floodplain is that area in-between the statutory flood defences. In many locations this floodable area is wide – the statutory flood defences being set back a considerable distance from the riverbank. Whilst properties and housing will continue to be protected behind the flood defences, large expanses of parkland, towpath and wildlife sites will be at increasing risk of inundation, for longer periods of time as climate changes. This will have an effect on many factors including the way that people use the public open spaces, on heritage, the established character and on the wildlife that makes the floodplain its home. Raising or building new flood defences or using the Thames Barrier (in the way that has been used in the past) is simply no longer an option. The Thames wants its floodplain back. Spaces that have been artificially managed as dry environments for decades are going to get a lot wetter over the next 25 years.

Rewilding Arcadia is proposing a series of nature based solutions to make the floodplain resilient to these changes. In this way the unique Freshwater / Tidal habitat (that is only found in the very upper reaches of the tidal estuary) and the parks, towpaths and wildlife sites upstream of Teddington Lock can be protected and enhanced. Features such as wet woodland, grazed wet meadows, reedbed, standing water and creeks can be enhanced and additional new areas created – measures that would be entirely appropriate for a wetter environment. Multiple benefits could be incorporated into any scheme including public access enhancements, quiet spaces, dry routes (during a flood), cool walks, viewing areas and the interpretation. New habitats could be used for carbon storage and for the filtering of pollution that runs off nearby roads. Backwaters and riverbank naturalisation would provide a refuge for aquatic animals during low and high water flow periods. The first phase of Rewilding Arcadia has introduced the aspirations of the scheme to stakeholders and TLS partners, bringing together a series of stand alone projects under one banner.

During 2022, the TLS teamed up with the Thames Estuary Partnership and the West London River Group to apply for funding for a review of the Thames Landscape Strategy 2012 Report, the Thames Strategy Kew to Chelsea and the Thames Strategy East. Funding was secured from the Thames Regional Flood and Coastal Committee to carry out this task. The funding is initially for a one period to scope the review running from March 2023 to March 2024. During this, the existing three strategies will be reviewed to establish what needs to be reviewed and who the key partners are to take the scheme forward. Cross cutting themes that would affect the wider Thames (within the areas covered by the three partnerships) will also be explored. Funding has been secured for the whole of the TLS region from Weybridge to Kew and whilst flood risk is the key driver, additional benefits and measures (such as recreation, historic heritage and views would continue to inform an integral part of the Strategy.

An appraisal of the work will be carried out midway through 2023 to inform whether additional funding would be appropriate to carry out the review and ultimately for the TLS to work with riparian Local Planning Authorities to produce a Riverside Strategy for their borough. Funding for the TLS includes working with the West London River Group to carry out the first phase of the review of the Thames Strategy Kew to Chelsea. The following sets out an indicative timetable for the rolling out of the scheme in the future.

Sept 2021 – March 2023 Rewilding Arcadia Phase One

The first phase of the project saw DEFRA funding to carry out a broad scoping exercise of the project across six key sites between Kew and Weybridge. This approach also gathered background information, carried out stakeholder and community consultation, completed an ecological and hydrological survey and has worked towards ensuring that the project is incorporated in the TE2100 Review.

April 2023 Rewilding Arcadia Phase Two

Publication of the findings of the Phase One Rewilding Arcadia project with a workshop. Phase Two of the project will look towards incorporating the project into a review of the Thames Landscape Strategy, building partner support, before more detailed plans and public consultation is carried out and landowner agreement is gained. The TLS will continue to carry out small demonstration projects such as willow spiling and the reopening of the Kew Meridian throughout this phase. In addition, any survey work that is appropriate can be carried out such as archaeological and invertebrate surveys. To scope and develop fundraising strategies for implementation including Thames wide biodiversity offsetting, local biodiversity offsetting schemes, CiL and Thames Water funding.

Priority projects to be taken forward in the Phase Two stage include The Old Deer Park and Kew Ha-ha and the Naturalisation of Canbury Gardens Riverside. The TLS will work with partners to investigate funding, continue to consult and refine aspirations. Measures that may be appropriate for Ham and Petersham will also continue to be investigated particularly through the JTSR process.

April 2023 – May 2025 Joint Review of the Thames Strategies

To work with partners and communities to start the review of the Thames Landscape Strategy. In particular, to work with landowners and stakeholders to consider how the nature based solutions to manage the floodplain that were proposed in Phase One of Rewilding Arcadia can be weaved into the review of the Thames Landscape Strategy to ensure that the established character of the Arcadian Thames is conserved whilst building resilience towards climate change. The project is funded by the Thames Regional Flood and Coastal Committee and is intended to lead to the production of borough wide Riverside Strategies that would consider the Rewilding Arcadia proposals.

2023 TE2100 Review

The TE2100 project, to manage flood risk along the tidal Thames will be reviewed in 2023. Changes in the management of flood risk along the Tideway to protect Central London are likely to increase flood risk in the Richmond and Twickenham reaches – water levels will be higher than at present, with inundation of the floodplain taking place more often. The date for this to happen by 2035. To continue to work with the EA to identify potential funding from biodiversity offsetting and carbon storage funds and Richmond and Hounslow Councils to find ways to live with water before the 2035 change on the operation of the Thames Barrier.

Sept 2024 onwards
